

buildings. In every county jail there is daily institutional work to be done. Every part of a jail should be kept spic and span. Although prisoners, other than those serving sentence, cannot be compelled to work under the law, they may be permitted to do so if they so desire.

Painting, repairing, cleaning, laundering, etc., offer daily opportunities for employment. Adequate facilities for laundering should be a part of every jail's equipment.

Prisoners should be carefully supervised when at work, especially when their employment is outside the jail, to guard against escapes, and to prevent smuggling contraband into the jail. Every person having charge of prisoners outside the jail should be deputized and responsible to the sheriff. Extreme care should be exercised in the selection of trusties.

DISCIPLINE AND PUNISHMENT

It is the duty of the sheriff or other officer in charge of a jail to treat all pris-
