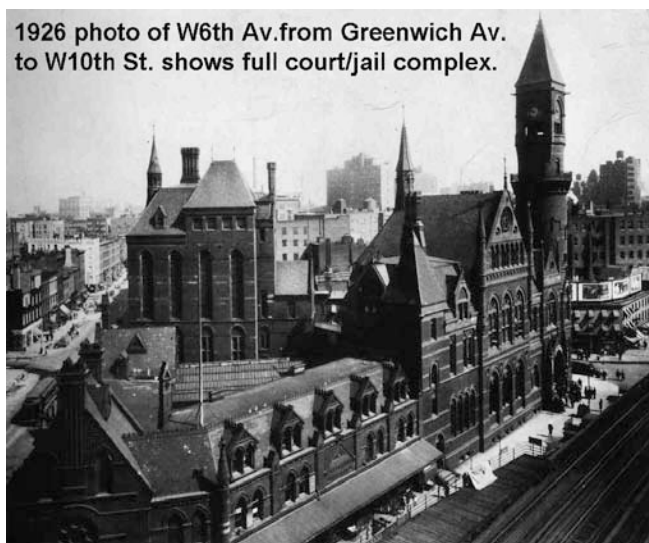


Jefferson Market Court & Jail History Retold in Library Flyer

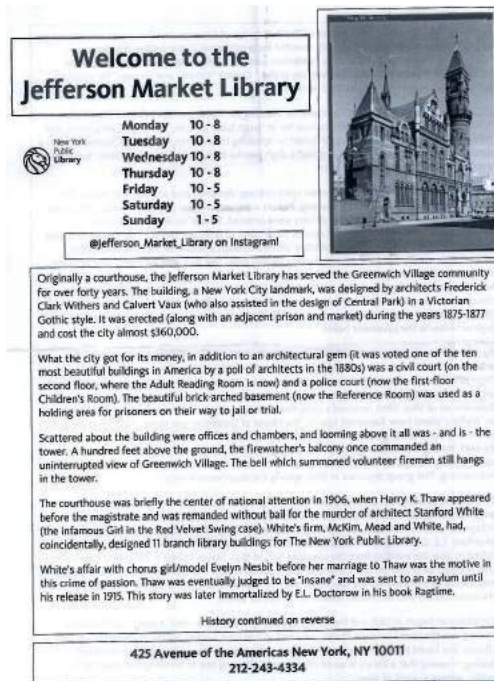

For nearly a century (circa 1875 – 1974), jails

were situated there: first the Jefferson Market Jail and later the Women's House of Detention. The flyer, front and back, provides an outline and highlights of that history.
